GENERAL INFORMATION

ABSENCES: Please telephone the school office, 923-1920, by 8:30 A.M. if your child is absent from school. You may call this number at any time beginning the afternoon before.

If your child will be absent because of travel 5 or more days, please contact the school office **at least 10 days** before the child will be gone. This will provide the time to prepare an Independent Study Contract for your child. This will help your child stay current with his/her class, and make this an excused absence. **A 10-day written notification is required prior to absence.**

TARDIES: Tardies are disruptive to both your child and his/her class. Punctuality is a habit that needs to be established while children are young. We would appreciate your cooperation in helping your child learn this important habit. Children must be in their class lines by 8:00A.M. for fourth and fifth grade students and 8:15 A.M. for kindergarten, first, second & third.

ARRIVAL TIMES: Playground supervision begins at 7:58 A.M. and we urge you not to send your children to school before that time, as we cannot be responsible for their safety.

PUPIL SIGN-OUT: Release of a child from school may only be made by a parent, legal guardian or person(s) listed on the emergency card. Anyone taking a child out of school **must sign their child out from the office**, not the classroom and must provide picture I.D.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS/TELEPHONE: Please notify the office of **any change in your address, telephone number or email address**. We would also appreciate being informed if the names/phone numbers of your emergency contacts change, including childcare.

CLASS ASSIGNMENTS: Student placement in a class at the beginning of the school year is temporary. Changes in the total school enrollment may require the reassignment of students to other classes (which may include combination classes). Gender, ethnicity, academic, social and emotional developments are some of the criteria used to create balanced classes. Infrequently, it may also be necessary to move some students mid-year because of enrollment changes.

SCHOOL VISITATION: All visitors and volunteers must check-in at the office regardless of their purpose for being on campus. This is a district requirement. Volunteers must have a current PPD (TB) test on file with the office.

TRAFFIC IN THE PARKING LOT: For the safety of students and staff, we ask that drivers follow safe and courteous driving rules on and around Laneview. Do not park or leave your car unattended in the pick-up areas. Drop off and pick-up students in the front of the school. No drop off or pick-up in the staff parking lot (on Laneview Drive). The San Jose Police Department monitors street parking.

HOMEWORK: Homework is an integral part of the student's total program. It is important for learning responsibility, good work habits and good study skills. It is an extension of classroom learning experiences and requirements vary within each grade level.

Suggestions to parents: provide a regular time and a quiet place for your child to do his/her work, be available to help when asked, and review the finished work. If your child has had a great deal of difficulty doing the work, let the teacher know by note or phone. You may wish to ask the teacher for specific suggestions.

BOOKS: Textbooks, library books and reference books are to be handled carefully by everyone. Books lost or damaged beyond repair must be replaced. It will be the responsibility of the student to whom the books have been assigned to pay for replacement or damaged or lost books. We value our collection of library materials. Please return library books on time and in good condition.

BICYCLES: Students in 3rd, 4th and 5th grades may ride their bikes to school as weather permits. All students riding their bikes to school must have a parent permission form on file. The form is available in the office. Students riding a bike to school must obey the following rules:

1. Rider must **wear** a bicycle helmet.
2. Rider must park and **lock the bicycle and helmet** in the bicycle rack area during the school day.
3. Rider must walk the bicycle while on school grounds.

Students who do not obey the above rules will be denied the right to bring their bicycle to school. Even though all precautions are taken for the safety and security of bicycles, the school is not responsible for damages or theft of bicycles, helmets or locks.

LOST & FOUND: Students who have lost an item at school should look in the "Lost and Found" area. Parents are welcome (and urged) to double check our "Lost & Found" at any time. **Marking students' jackets, coats and belongings with their first and last names will help us return the articles to the correct child.**

LUNCH PROGRAM: Lunch is available on a daily basis for all students. Lunch may be purchased in advance at school or online or paid daily, weekly or monthly. **Lunch is \$2.75.** Free and reduced lunch applications are available in the main office upon request.

OFFICE: The school office hours are 7:30 A.M. - 4:00 P.M. on school days. The telephone will be answered during those hours and someone will be here to assist you during that time. Our office phone number is (408) 923-1920.

STAYING AFTER SCHOOL: If it is necessary for your child to stay after school for any reason, you will receive a phone call from his/her or the teacher. State law allows school personnel to detain children up to one hour after school for assistance to make-up time due to tardies, for behavioral reasons, etc., providing the parents are notified. Parents are responsible for arranging transportation home following this after school time.

SUPPORT PROGRAMS

HEALTH SERVICES: Berryessa Health Services are provided by a district nurse who serves the needs of the district's schools. The district nurse's chief concern is the physical and emotional health of the students. To this end, she implements a number of programs such as: screening tests for vision, hearing, dental health and scoliosis (abnormal lateral curvature of the spine). Please contact the school if your child has been diagnosed with a communicable disease. You will be notified if your child has been exposed to a particular communicable disease at school.

FIRST AID: First aid is given for common injuries that occur at school. The purpose of first aid is to make the student as comfortable as possible and to prevent further injury. 9-1-1 will be called for serious injuries. The school will contact parents/guardians for any serious injury or illness. It is the responsibility of the parent or guardian to seek medical care or advice.

MEDICATION: Medication is not administered at the school unless your physician has completed the District medication form. Most medications can be timed so that they can be given at home by the parent. All medications are kept in the school office. Please do not send medication to school with your child. Students are not to have any type of medication in their possession, including over-the-counter medicine such as cough drops, aspirin, etc.

MEDICAL AND DENTAL APPOINTMENTS: Please make appointments before or after school hours. If this is not possible and your child must be released from school, please send a note and ask that your child be in the office at a designated time and bring a note from the doctor upon the child's return to school. All students must be signed out of the office prior to release from school.

TRANSFERS: When a student is moving, please notify the office at least a week in advance. Teachers need to prepare placement information for the new school.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES: Schools practice emergency procedures once a month. In the event of a real emergency our district emergency calling system (NTI) will notify you.

CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT REPORTING: All school employees are required by law to report any suspected abuse or neglect cases to Child Protective Services. All reports will be kept confidential.

WAYS TO COMMUNICATE TO STAFF: Every teacher has email, voice mail and a mailbox in the office. Don't hesitate to use these avenues of communication. Your ideas, suggestions, or concerns are important to us, and we will respond in a timely manner. Check out our website by going to our district website at: www.berryessa.k12.ca.us and then clicking on schools.

ELL (English as a Second Language): Children who do not speak English at a tested standard receive instruction individually or in groups as a part of the regular program.

STUDENT STUDY TEAM (SST): The SST meets to share information about children who have been referred by the teachers because of learning concerns. Members of the committee carefully assess the child's needs, pool available information and make recommendations to help the child find success. The SST may consist of the school psychologist, counselor, language and speech specialist, resource specialist, school social worker, classroom teachers, principal and parents. Special Education services are considered only after the resources of the regular education program have been explored and where appropriate.

SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION: The Supplemental instruction program is provided for students who are falling behind academically. In order to qualify a student must be identified as being challenged at their grade level..

BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS

Note: Specific classroom and playground rules will be covered with the students during the first week of school and reviewed periodically.

GENERAL EXPECTATIONS: We expect the students to use good judgment in their actions at school and to respect themselves, their teachers and the rights of other students. Good behavior is essential for effective learning. Those who lack self-discipline not only interfere with their own learning, but also prevent others in the class from learning. We want all of our students to be successful at school.

ITEMS NOT PERMITTED AT SCHOOL: Students are not permitted to bring items such as toys, games, trading/collector cards, comic books, electronic games, radios, cameras, CD player, pagers, sports equipment, skateboards or rollerblades to school. The use of cell phone are not permitted during school hours. The school will not be responsible for the loss of any personal items.

FLAG SALUTE: There will be a daily Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. It is the teacher's responsibility to see that this policy is carried out in an appropriate manner. The policy shall not be interpreted as requiring persons to salute who are legally entitled not to salute. (This is Berryessa District Policy 6115).

BERRYESSA SCHOOL DISTRICT BEHAVIOR STANDARDS

1. While at school or on the way to and from school, students are expected to observe standards of behavior developed by the school and district.
2. Students are expected to recognize and respect the authority of the teachers, principal, and other school staff, including substitute teachers, teacher aides, secretaries, custodians, cafeteria personnel, noon supervisors, bus drivers and school volunteers working in the school.
3. Students are expected to be in school every day, and should not be tardy to any class.
4. Students are expected to respect the rights, feelings and property of others.
5. Students are expected to use appropriate language at all times and refrain from using profanity, obscene gestures, and racial slurs.
6. Students are not to cause, threaten, or attempt to cause physical injury to another person.
7. Students are required to remain at school during school hours unless signed-out through the school office.
8. Students are never to have, or be under the influence of drugs, alcohol or tobacco.
9. Students are not to possess, sell or supply any firearm, knife, or explosive.
10. Students are expected to dress in a clean, safe and appropriate manner consistent with school dress codes.
11. State law gives the principal or designee the authority to suspend pupils from school in accordance with school, district, and state guidelines.

DISTRICT DRUG, ALCOHOL AND TOBACCO

REGULATIONS: The Berryessa Board of Trustees goal is to keep students free from tobacco, alcohol and drugs. They recognize that student use of these substances adversely affects their ability to achieve academically, is physically and emotionally harmful, and has serious social and legal consequences and they will not be tolerated on any school campus. The Board supports cooperation between schools, parents/guardians, students, law enforcement, and other appropriate community agencies and organizations which are involved in tobacco, alcohol, and other drug prevention programs.

The Superintendent or designee will take appropriate action to eliminate possession, use and sale of tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs and related paraphernalia on school grounds, at school events, or in any situation in which the school is responsible for the conduct and well-being of students. Students possessing, selling and/or using alcohol or other drugs or related paraphernalia will be subject to disciplinary procedures which may result in suspension or expulsion.

SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL (SSC): California state law requires that schools establish a School Site Council. Our Council will include the principal, parents and community, and staff members. The Council meets monthly to review and update the school plan and provide community input. Members usually serve two years and officers serve one year. Elections are held in September.

DISTRICT HARASSMENT POLICY

The Governing Board prohibits harassment of or by any student, or by anyone in or from the district.

Teachers shall discuss this policy with their students in age-appropriate ways and should assure them that they need not tolerate any form of harassment including any racial or ethnic slur.

Any student who engages in harassment of anyone in or from the district may be subject to disciplinary action up to and including expulsion.

The Board expects students or staff to immediately report incidents of harassment to the principal or designee or to another district administrator. The district prohibits retaliatory behavior against any complainant or any participant in the complaint process. Each complaint of harassment shall be promptly investigated in a way that respects the privacy of all parties concerned.

COMMUNICATION

BACK TO SCHOOL NIGHT: On Back to School Night you will have an opportunity to visit your child's classroom and hear the teacher explain expectations and the program for the school year. Back to School Night is held early in the school year. This is an evening for adults, and children are not to attend. They will be welcome at our Open House in the spring.

COMMUNICATION NOTICES: Keeping parents informed about our school program, special events and other newsworthy items is very important to us. The school newsletter will be sent home or emailed monthly. Please look for the newsletters and other notices that are sent home and be sure to review them as they will contain information pertinent to you, your student, and the school. This is our most direct line of communication between the home and the school.

CONFERENCES/REPORT CARDS: Conferences for all parents are scheduled in **November** and **March**. If a conference is needed at any other time, please call the teacher. There may be a change to your child's schedule during conference periods. Please check the school newsletter for dismissal times.

OPEN HOUSE: In the spring, an Open House is held. It provides an opportunity for both students and parents to visit the classroom together, talk with the teacher and view some of the work students have completed.

PARENT ORGANIZATION/PTA: The goal of the parent organization is to encourage cooperation between the home, school and community for the best advantages for our children. Our goal is to work together to sponsor diverse activities for you and your children.

VOLUNTEERS: Parents are encouraged to volunteer at school. Please contact your child's teacher if you are available. This is a powerful way of showing your child how important their schooling is to you. You must have an updated PPD (TB) test on file with the school office.

Laneview Student Dress Code

Laneview School enforces a student dress code in order to maintain a positive school climate and ensure the safety of all students. Any attire or grooming disruptive to the instruction process, which may include, but is not limited to:

- Clothing considered to be unsafe, dangerous or a health hazard.
- Clothing with pictures or symbols deemed inappropriate. Drugs, sex, violence, alcohol, tobacco, offensive slogans or words degrading to any gender, cultural or ethnic values.
- Hair color or hair design that is disruptive to the classroom or campus.
- Clothing that allows underwear to be exposed.
- Tops which reveal the chest, midriff or stomach. Tank tops, halter tops, backless tops, spaghetti straps and tube tops are not allowed.
- “Sagging” or excessively baggy pants are not allowed.
- Shorts and skirts must be the length of the fingertips extended. No short shorts or mini skirts.
- No slippers, sandals, flip flops, slides, platform, high heeled or “Heelies” (shoes with wheels).
- No hats, caps or hoods are worn in the building.
- Rips on clothing in inappropriate areas. Clothing must be free of rips and tears.
- No dangling chains or belts.

Consequences of Dress Code Violations:

Students who are in violation of the dress code may be sent home to change to appropriate clothing.

Quy tắc trang phục của trường Laneview

Trường LANEVIEW xin nhấn mạnh về sự trang phục của các em học sinh để giúp duy trì một môi trường khả quan và đảm bảo an toàn cho tất cả các học sinh. Bất kỳ trang phục hay chải chuốt gây sự rối loạn cho quá trình giảng dạy, trong đó có thể bao gồm, nhưng không giới hạn:

- Quần áo thể hiện không an toàn, nguy hiểm, hoặc nguy hiểm cho sức khỏe.
- Quần áo có hình ảnh hoặc biểu tượng không phù hợp. Ma túy, quan hệ tình dục, bạo lực, rượu, thuốc lá, khẩu hiệu xúc phạm hoặc văn từ phạm nhục đến bất kỳ giới tính, nền văn hóa hoặc giá trị dân tộc.
- Màu tóc hoặc kiểu tóc gây sự rối loạn cho lớp học hay khuôn viên trường.
- Mặc quần áo lộ liễu đồ lót.
- Không được phép bận các áo lộ ngực, hoặc bụng. Áo sát tay, áo dây, áo hở lưng, áo hai dây và áo ống.
- Không được phép bận quần "chảy xệ" hoặc quần rộng thùng thình.
- Chiều dài các quần đùi và váy phải bằng chiều dài của cánh tay dang xuống. Không được bận quần đùi hay váy ngắn.
- Không được mang dép/slippers, giày quai dép/sandals, flip flops, giày cao gót.
- Không được đội mũ/nón hoặc trùm mũ trong trường.
- Bận quần áo rách ở những chỗ không phù hợp. Quần áo phải được nguyên vẹn
- Không mang dây chuyền lủng lẳng hoặc dây nịt.

Hậu quả khi vi phạm quy tắc trang phục:

Những em học sinh nào vi phạm quy tắc trang phục có thể bị trả về nhà để thay quần áo phù hợp.

Código de vestuario estudiantil de Laneview

La escuela Laneview impone un código de vestuario estudiantil para mantener un ambiente positivo y seguro para todos los estudiantes. Cualquier vestimenta o apariencia perjudicial al proceso de instrucción que puede incluir, pero no se limitan a:

- Ropa considerada insegura y peligrosa o nociva para la salud.
- Ropa con imágenes o símbolos considerados inapropiados sobre drogas, sexo, violencia, alcohol, tabaco, lemas ofensivos o palabras degradantes para cualquier género, cultural o de valores étnicos.
- Color de pelo o diseño del cabello que perturba a la clase o escuela.
- Ropa que permite exponer la ropa interior.
- Camisetas que revelan el pecho, cintura o el estómago. Camisetas, camisetas sin mangas, blusas sin espalda, tirantes delgados y blusas de tubo no están permitidos.
- Pantalones desaliñados o pantalones excesivamente grandes no son permitidos.
- Pantalones cortos y faldas deben tener una longitud al nivel de los dedos extendidos. No se corta shorts o minifaldas.
- No chanclas, sandalias, chancletas, zapatos abiertos, zapatos con plataforma, tacón alto o "Heelies" (zapatos con ruedas).
- No se permite usar sombreros, gorras o capuchas en el edificio.
- Ropa rasgada en áreas inapropiadas. La ropa debe estar libre de roturas y desgarros.
- No se permiten cadenas que cuelgan o cinturones.

Consecuencias a las violaciones del Código de vestir:

Los estudiantes que están en violación del código de vestir pueden ser enviados a casa para cambiarse a ropa adecuada.

Laneview學生著裝規定

Laneview小學強制執行學生著裝，以維護一個積極的學校氛圍，確保所有學生的安全。任何破壞規定的服裝或儀容包括如下，但不限於：

- 服裝被視為不安全的，危險或危害健康。
- 服裝搭配的圖片或符號被視為不恰當的。毒品，性，暴力，酒精，煙草以及對任何性別，文化或種族的攻擊性口號或有辱人格的言語。
- 頭髮顏色或髮型設計破壞教室或校園的規定。
- 暴露內衣的服裝。
- 暴露胸部，腹部或胃部的上衣。背心，露肩吊帶衫，露背上衣，細肩帶是不允許的。
- “下垂”或過於寬鬆的褲子都是不允許的。
- 短褲和裙子必須長達指尖的長度。不允許短褲或迷你裙。
- 不允許拖鞋，涼鞋，人字拖，滑鞋，厚高鞋，高跟或“Heelies”（有輪子的鞋）。
- 不允許在室內戴帽子和頭套。
- 不允許服裝在不適當的部位有撕裂。服裝必須是無裂縫和破損。
- 不可以懸掛鏈條或腰帶。

違反著裝規定的後果：

凡違反著裝規定的學生可能被送回家更換適當的衣服。

Kodigo sa Pananamit ng mga Mag-aaral sa Laneview

Ipinatutupad ng Paaralang Laneview ang kodigo ng pananamit sa mga mag-aaral upang mapanatili ang positibong klima sa paaralan at siguruhin ang kaligtasan ng lahat ng mag-aaral. Anumang kasuotan o uri ng bihis na makakatawag pansin sa pagpapatuloy ng pagtuturo, kasama ang, ngunit hindi limitado sa:

- Pananamit na tinuturing na hindi ligtas, mapanganib o banta sa kalusugan.
- Pananamit na may mga larawan o simbolo na hindi angkop. Droga, seks, karahasan, alcohol, tabako, nakagagalit na bansag o mga salita na nagpapababa ng uri ng anumang kasarian, kultura o katutubong kahalagahan.
- Kulay ng buhok o disenyo ng buhok na makatawag pansin sa klase o sa kampus.
